Chapter 1 Executive Summary

Background

Unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) operate within one of three categories; Open, Specific or Certified. This consultation primarily impacts Open category operations. More details on the categories of UAS can be found in the table below. The boxes in red highlight the areas being consulted on.

Within the Open category, 'legacy' UAS and 'transitional' UAS (those which do not conform to class mark product standards) may currently be used as follows:

- Legacy: indefinitely, but only when the UAS was newly placed on the market before 01 Jan 2023.
- Transitional: Only until 31 December 2022.

Legacy UAS arrangements allow for UAS that do not confirm to a Class Marking standard, that are placed on the market prior to the 01st of Jan 2023, to operate indefinitely in the A1 or A3 sub-categories of the Open Category. Within the current regulatory framework, any UAS placed on the market after the 01st of Jan 2023 can not be flown under Legacy UAS privileges.

Transitional UAS arrangements allow for UAS (that meet certain technical and operational requirements) to be operated in the A1, A2, and A3 subcategories for the Open category until the end of 2022. Within the current regulatory framework, no UAS can be flown under Transitional Category privileges after the end of 2022.

Why are we consulting?

The CAA does not believe that the UK has in place the necessary infrastructure to move away from non-class marked UAS, to class marked UAS by 01 Jan 2023, and so would like to consult on a proposal to extend the legacy and transitional period, to allow time for the necessary steps to be taken by Government; some of these include:

- Establishment of the market surveillance authority
- Establishment of conformity assessment bodies
- Creation and adoption of relevant standards

The purpose of this consultation is to gauge stakeholder support for, or against, an extension to the Legacy and Transitional UAS provisions described above, and for how long, and to better understand the impact of making this change, or not.

Note: In March 2022, EASA announced the European Union's decision to extend the applicability dates of both Transitional and Legacy UAS under their own regulatory framework. As the UK is no longer a member of the EU there is no compulsion for the UK to automatically mirror what the EU or EASA does. However, it may be useful to recognise that the EU have responded in this way in the face of similar practical challenges.
